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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya is one of the 24 colleges the Government of West Bengal decided to establish in 1977. Mr. Hemendra Narayan Chaudhary took the first initiative to open a college between the city of Berhampore and Bangladesh Border (Jalangi).

Early in 1980, attempts were made by Tapan Kumar Hore, Puri Lal Biswas, Satish Charan Dey, Kartrik Dutta, Solamen Hoque, Durgaprasad Maheshwari, Rabindranath Rakhsit, Dibakar Dutta and others. They under MLA Smt. Chaya Ghosh collected money and assets for land. Upendra Smriti Seba Mandir of Purilal Biswas provided early housing for academic activities. In November, 1981, the college began its formal journey.

In four temporary classrooms of Seba Mandir, teachers like Kamalendu Bhattacharyya, Amulya Kumar Sarkar, Nripendranath Kundu, Anowar Hossain and Dilip Chakraborty taught voluntarily. The Ministry of Higher Education headed by Sri Shombhu Ghosh helped get the Calcutta University affiliation in 1981 In 1985, a plot of six bighas was bought from Sri Durgapada Dutta and Dhananjoy Dutta. Money was donated by 'Union no. 4 Company of Multipurpose Society', 'Chandrakanta Lalit Mohan Resham Khadi', Rural Industry Association, Chak Weavers' Association, Upenda Smriti, Chak Bayan Shilpi Samiti and others. MLA of Jalangi, Atahar Rahaman extended a helping hand for the construction of the building on the college land. In 1999, the college got affiliation from University of Kalyani.

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya is firm in spreading the light of quality education among the marginalized sections of Islampur, Raninagar, Domkal and Daulatabad blocks. The college serves rural learners in remote and underdeveloped areas. About 95% of students belong to minority communities (mostly Muslims and Other Backward Classes) and the Scheduled Castes. Currently (2024), around 3300 students get enrolled each year.. The college is determined to integrate the needs of individuals as well as society in order to create new value-based youth. Our college aims to be the beacon of hope for the marginalized areas that will shine the light of education amongst all strata of society. Thus, let us pierce the dark veil of ignorance, remove illiteracy and poverty, and truly prove to be a vehicle of modernization and development.

Vision

The vision of Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya is to transform this college into a center of excellence in the district of Murshidabad, in West Bengal, and in India. The college aspires to soar high despite so many difficulties and challenges and is single-minded about generating a substantial number of useful human resources. The college is strongly determined to disseminate knowledge and education smoothly and freely among all strata of society, irrespective of caste, creed, gender and religion, and among various weaker, underprivileged, poverty-stricken, differently-abled and the so called 'the other' people. The college has a responsibility to make every student a respectable and responsible citizen of

India. The college emphasizes the career building of the students as well as a sound value-based education so that the ward contributes to the holistic development of the country as well as the locality the pupil belongs to. The college particularly focuses on women education, women empowerment, and gender-bias free development, especially because of the minority-based migrant labour population (mostly Muslims) of the locality. The college inculcates among its pupils a strong sense of obligation towards the Constitution of India and the Human Rights.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya strictly adheres to and follows the Curriculum and Academic Calendar of University of Kalyani. The implementation of curriculum delivery is smart, swift and effective. Heads of the Deapartments, faculties and member/s of Board of studies play pivotal role in this. Academic Calendar is meticulously prepared and then strictly followed. A master routine is prepared and then a Departmental routine is formulated, based on which academic activities like classes taken throughout the semesters. Regular Departmental meetings are held to carry out the blueprints of the Academic Calendar, Master Routine and Departmental Routine. Continuous Internal Assessment is done with remarkable transparency, agility and impact. ICT-skill is encouraged among teachers and students, taking help of LMS. KOHA, OPAC, INFLIBNET are powerful tools to achieve learning outcome.

A 40-hour value added course with 100 students has been performed in 2022-23. Certificates of course completion have been given to 59 students.

Our college integrates various crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum, sometimes adding new and pertinent issues. In subjects like Philosophy, Education, Political Science, Geography, history, Benagli, English and ENVS, cross-cutting issues like gender, professional ethics, human values, environmental

issues of sustainability are abundant and relevant. These issues always address the burning issues of the day. For practical implementation of this, various relevant programs and days like the gender sensitization program, tree plantation program, Yoga Day, International Women's Day are done.

Students of particularly Geography Department perform project and field works, whereas all students perform project work in ENVS. Students in the Education Department have done dissertations.

Effective feedback system is operational. Feedback has mainly been taken from students and teachers during the last five years except lockdown period when only one online feedback was taken. Feedback has been collected, analysed, action taken and communicated to proper body and hosted on the college website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The admission procedure is absolutely transparent, as it is centrally done in complete online mode. However, any kind of grievance regarding admission is taken utmost care of. Rules and Reservation policies of Govt of India and Govt of West Bengal are absolutely followed in case of admission of various sections of society like physically disabled, SC/STs, OBCs, Generals etc.

Enrollment percentage of seats against sanctioned seats of the last five years is 71.1%. Percentage of seats filled against seats reserved for various categories during the last five years is 43.54.

Number of actual students admitted from the reserved categories during the last five years are 2673. Number of seats earmarked for reserved category as per GOI/ State Govt rule year wise during the last five years 6139.

For an effective teaching-learning process, the college has taken care of recruiting qualified teachers. The present teacher-student ratio is 161.54.

Percentage of full-time teachers against sanctioned posts during the last five years 87.86 and the number of sanctioned posts year wise during the last five years is 28.

Some teachers have PhD (6)and MPhil (3)

Mechanism of internal and external assessment is transparent. The grievance redressal system is time-bound and effective. Regular parent teacher and student teacher meetings are held. Relevant notices, results are displayed on notice boards and college website. Grievance for exam/low marks is quickly redressed. In case of University examination related issue, Scrutiny system, Review and RTI systems are operational.

Course outcomes and program outcomes are clearly defined and displayed on notice board by the respective Departments. They are intimated to students. Attainment of POs and COs are evaluated.

Pass percentage of students during last five years is 90.24.

Number of final years students who passed the university examination year wise during the last five years is 650, 493, 191, 140, 191.

The number of appeared student is year wise last five years 680, 513, 205, 170, 277.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya involves itself to create an ecosystem for innovations, Indian Knowledge System (IKS), including awareness about IPR and takes other initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge and technology. Their outcomes are self-evident.

The study of indigenous language such as Bengali reflects such knowledge. Yoga, Herbal gardening, Indian literature in English reflect Vedic and Upanishadic knowledge and national sentiments. Indian history, polity, geography, music are well reflected in the CBCS curricula of Kalyani University. Introduction of add-on course has been a special feature of the college. Celebrations of days like Yoga Day, National Youth Day, Women's Day, Republic Day, Independence Day etc uphold national sentiments.

Under IQAC, all seminars are held with the direct involvement of Research and Development Cell. National level seminars and others seminars regularly take place. RDC also encourages teachers and students alike to write research papers and publish them in UGC Care List journals and reputed foreign journals. College has signed 6 MoUs with the neighbouring colleges. INFLIBNET facility in the library has given access to innumerable e-resources and e-reading. Entrepreneurship is always encouraged for all students. Job-oriented seminars and interactions with different companies and organisations regularly happen.

Number of research papers published in the Journals notified on UGC care list during the last five years is 6.

Total number of workshops/seminars/conferences during last five years is 2 (national).

Number of books and chapters in edited volumes/books published and papers published in national/international conference proceedings during last five years is 19.

Number of teaching staff/full time teachers during the last five years varies between 27 to 29.

The college arranges extensive outreach activities regularly through NSS on gender disparity, social disparity, women's health and hygiene, mental health, human trafficking and cyber crimes, AIDS, Yoga, Covid Vaccination, Thalassemia etc.

Number of extension and outreach programme is 20. College has received one certificate from govt agency for its contribution to blood donation.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya has good infrastructure and other facilities for teaching-learning in the areas of classrooms, laboratories, computing instruments, LMS etc..

We have two buildings, with 19 classrooms, 2 laboratories, 3 ICT-enabled room (of which room no 10 is smart classroom), one AC auditorium and a good library. We have a Girls' common room, Boys' Common Room and a Guest Room among many others. There are 3 ramps, one stretcher, one wheel chair for physically disabled. LMS is functional in the college.

We have wonderful sports and cultural facilities. We have one playground where sports like Football, cricket, voley ball, badminton, kabbadi, kho-kho etc take place. Yoga and meditations, Indoor games regularly happen. At big open theatre, many cultural programmes like annual function, singing, dancing take place.

The college updates its internet facility on a regular basis. Presently we have two internet providers, one BSNL, another Allianz Broadband, both with a speed of 125 mbps. LAN is regularly updated. There are 32 CCTV cameras with EVR and DVR. The college is automated with open source software (Cloud Version- 22.11.06.000 dated 16.08.23). We have KOHA software version 22.11.17 and INFLIBNET and OPAC. We have Linux operating system and QGIS software. Internet and free wi-fir facility is available almost everywhere in the premise. College website is maintained by Aidni Infotec Pvt Ltd with AMC. College has 27 desktop, 14 printers, 10 Laptops, 4 projectors, 3 scanners, protected by antivirus with AMC. Student-computer ratio is low.

Student Support and Progression

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya is committed to student support and progression through various committees and subcommittees such as Career Counseling and Planning Cell, Student Aid Fund, Student Health and Support Cell, Finance Commitee, Students' Grievance Redressal Cell, Student Credit Card Management, Kanyashree Scheme, All types of scholarship schemes, etc. All these committees are in favour of the students and have definite policies for the help and upliftment of students.

Students are the beneficiaries of freeships from the college. Number of students benefited by scholarships are approximately 13752 (from 2018-19 to 2022-23).

Various kinds of skill enhancement, life skill, computing skills, soft skills, language and communication skills earning skill are taught systematically to students.

Guidance for competitive examinations are given regularly. Different organisations such as RICE, Bandhan Bank, George Telegraph come time to time to collaborate with us.

The college has a strong students grievance redressal cell. We also have a strict ICC cell that looks after the complaints of from girls students and female teachers or staff regarding sexual harassment. ICC entertains no deviation. We have a strong Anti-Ragging Cell that acts strictly according to rules, making it a ragging free campus. We have zero tolerance policy regarding all these.

Although the college does not have any Placement Cell, we have a good number of students placed comfortably in service and other sectors. Moreover, the student progression rate is satisfactory.

We have a good number of students who pass UGC NET/SET exams regularly. Besides, students pass state level SSC, TET, B.Ed, M.Ed examinations etc.

In the field of sports and culture the college has a good many students who bring distinctions from district level. In the college sports and cultural ceremonies, they performed outstandingly. There is an unregistered Alumni Association. It is yet to be registered.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The plan and policy structures of Murshidabada Adarsha Mahavidyalaya are clearly in alignment with the mission and vision of the institution. To fulfil the vision and mission of the college, every wing works in tandem. The Governing Body takes all important decisions in Finance, Education and Infrastructural Development. The Governing Body entrusts and directs the Principal to implement, supervise and maintain all aspects mentioned above. The Principal engages the IQAC, Teachers' Council, NSS, all Heads of the Departments, all Convenors of various academic committees, sub-committees and Cells, all faculty members, Librarian and non-teaching staff along with casual staff of the college to execute the directions of the Governing Body. Different committees and subcommittees and cells aim for the smooth functioning of every organ of the college. The committees undertake new initiatives, sustain them and enhance them.

Days like National and International Holidays, Annual Days, Memorial Days are observed. Community works in the neighborhood are done by NSS together with various Departments. The heads of the departments enjoy considerable freedom and autonomy in running the departments.

M.A.Mahavidyalaya has a zero tolerance policy regarding Ragging, sexual harassment against women, There are policies for plastic free campus, pure drinking water, freeships e-governance and green campus.

The appointment process, service rules, promotions, and other procedures of the UGC recognised teachers and Librarian are effected by Rules, Regulations and Statutes of UGC and West Bengal Higher Education Department. Non-teaching staff are effected by Rules, Regulations and Statutes of West Bengal Higher Education Department

There are strategies of the Institution for Optimal Utilization of Resources. The fund mobilizations take place in many areas for students' benefits. The Finance Committee takes the initial responsibility of financial matter. The accounts of the college are audited regularly through Internal Audit and External Audit. External Audit is done every year.

On a regular basis, the IQAC reviews the teaching and learning process, structures and methodologies of operations, and learning outcomes. The IQAC closely observes and records the incremental improvement in various activities in the college.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Our Institution has some values and best practices for which the college is distinctly known. In our curriculam, we have explicit and implicit references to gender equity, and in our classroom interactions, we make the most of the curricula to apprise our students of various genders about gender equality and gender neutrality. Various committees like ICC (Internal Complaints Committee), WDC, Students' Grievance and Redressal Committee, Anti-Ragging Cell and IQAC help us achieve that.

We have installed close circuit cameras (CCTVs) almost everywhere, which are constantly monitored by a team headed by the principal. Washrooms are cleanly maintained. There is a Girls' Common Room equipped with two Napkin Vending Machines. Programmes, discussions and seminars on Gendersensitization, Women Development, Mothers' Day Celebration etc are conducted on a regular basis.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

In concordance with National Education Policy 2020
(NEP 2020), which seeks to implement India's hoary
past traditional knowledge with the modern technico-
scientific knowledge of east and west, Murshidabad

Adarsha Mahavidyalaya is well prepared to face the challenges of executing NEP 2020 policies. Accordingly, multi-disciplinary or interdisciplinary subjects are introduced, and strategies are made for the same. In this respect, our college always adheres to and follows the instructions of Kalyani University. To enhance the skills and competencies of the students, faculties from various departments take classes of the departments other than their own. So apart from gaining knowledge of their own subjects, students achieve more usable knowledge of other interrelated subjects and skills, which will be reflected in real life situations. The curriculum is so devised that a student of Geography may gain knowledge of English language and literature, and vice versa, or, a student of Bengali Department may benefit from the lectures of Political Science. Our college is determined to deliver dynamic, varied, ingenious, and flexible knowledge. The college has academic collaborations with 11 neighbouring colleges, one university (Swami Vivekananda University), and one private organisation. 6 of them have been in the academic year 2018-2023. Faculty exchange programmes do take place occasionally. The Governing Body, Principal, Teachers' Council and above all, IQAC constantly monitor the innovative ideas and new NEP 2020 policies being implemented with all goodwill and determination.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

ABC is a project that comes with the implementation of NEP 2020 that has introduced a 4-year undergraduate programme in all HEIs. Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya follows the regulations and instructions of Kalyani University in all its academic and administrative aspects. Academic Bank of Credits is a new innovative idea emanating from UGC and implemented by Kalyani University in all its affiliated institutions. In a notification Ref.No. CoE/ABC-ID/2/U.G/2023, the University has instructed us to register in ABC. Our college has followed the advisory and has told all its students to register themselves for ABC. Likewise, our students have registered themselves for the same. The University is yet to make a full blueprint for ABC to ensure a smooth and effective teaching learning curriculum. ABC is basically a digitised repository or digital stockroom to store and issue credits to a student based on his academic performances

throughout. It is a process in which a student will earn different credits from one or many institutions so that any HEI can assess his/her achievement at a glance at any given point of time. Thus, it actually paves the way for the multidisciplinary approaches initiated by UGC. The implementation of ABC would require a robust documentation process and infrastructural capacity. The university would also need a highclass repository on its own, like a central repository system. Currently, in our college, we can only store credits for semesters in a cumulative way, and so far, it remains a matter of intra-university but its prospects and future are very bright. Our college already manages many things digitally, like the admission process, academic process, and administrative process. Our college portal acts as a powerful platform from which students can benefit all the digital privileges like admission, exam form fill-up, getting admit cards, availing scholarships, etc The office of our college is strong enough to handle ABC but help from University is also needed. Needless to say, there are IQAC and various Academic Sub-committees to help them establish and continue a strong ABC.

3. Skill development:

As Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya constantly engages itself in many observatory and celebratory days and many varied kinds of programmes and camps, it basically aims at building and strengthening the skills of students at various levels and degrees. Programmes such as seminars, talks, invited lectures, add-on courses, value education, life skills, yoga, football, cricket, dancing, singing, dissertations, project works, debates, quizzes, extempore, and many others only serve the purpose of enhancing their cognitive, creative capability. As our college believes in a value-based education, it inculcates among its students human values and rights, constitutional values and rights, humanistic values and rights, cultural and aesthetic values, and ethics for the allround, holistic development of the students. Computer-based competencies are growing in our college. NSS takes all necessary steps to promote skills at various levels. All Departments also take special care to enhance the skills of their students.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya has integrated Indian Knowledge System (IKS) by teaching in Indian and using online courses. The college has

taken initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge and technology. The outcomes of the same are evident. Indian Knowledge system means an understanding of ancient Indian knowledge and modern Indian knowledge. The range may be extended to yoga, medicine, health in general, politics, astrology and astrophysics, chemistry, surgery, environment, so on and so forth. The knowledge system so mentioned is scientifically reflected in the CBCS curricula of Kalyani University, which our college follows. The college delivers such knowledge both in offline and online mode. Such knowledge is contained in subjects like Philosophy, History, Political Science, Education, Geography, Bengali and English. The study of Bengali literature may well reflect the regional, cultural designs of indigenous nature, the study of English may reflect the national culture and nuances as reflected in translated Indian literature and original Indian writing in English. The college very often upholds Yoga as a style of life. Our ancient Vedic knowledge disseminated through the congregation actually contributes to the overall development of personality of our students, leading to specific skills and expertise. IQAC celebrates different important occasions and does various cultural programs, like World Yoga day Day and Annual Cultural Program. Our learners are integrated into ancient Indian history, polity, geography, arts, music etc. This gives them a distinct self-identity and self-respect. Add-on course has been introduced for value-based education . We mostly choose indigenous Bengali language and English language to communicate with our students both online and offline, following bilingual mode, as suggested by various Education Commissions of India. International Mother Language Day (February 21)), Yoga Day, Republic Day, National Youth Day, Netaji Birthday, Teachers' Day, Independence Day are celebrated with the motto of integration of Indian Knowledge systems. The college has created an atmosphere for innovation and research through Research Development Cell which has laid emphasis on Yoga and Traditional herbal gardening.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

It has been the first priority of Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya to implement Outcome based education (OBE) and effective student-centric learning methods. Following the guidelines of UGC,

the IQAC has been operative in the framework of Course Outcome, Program Outcome and the attainment of both since 2018-19. The institution has started new add-on Course from 2022-23. Under IQAC, all Departments make a blueprint of the Course Outcome and Program Outcome at the beginning of the semester and let the students know what they are going to learn and what will be neat results of their learning. The outcomes of CO and PO are published on the notice board and lately, on the website. Teachers strive for continuous attainment of PSOs throughout the year with students. Best knowledge and skills are extracted and supplemented by regular counselling, professional guidance program, constant mentoring and monitoring, and regular employment input. Debates, quizzes, and extempore competitions are inducted so as to enhance their problem solving capability. Their software skills are enhanced through various ICT-enabled methods. Experiential learning is expedited through regular study tours, fieldwork, yoga, and neighborhood activities. Program specific attainment is achieved through curricula, co-curricula and extr-curricular activities through Departments and NSS unit. The learning outcomes of students are mapped and measured by CIE (Continuous Internal Evaluation) and Term End Examination. To instill cognitive, scientific, and philosophical ability among students, the two systems have been highly beneficial, firstly the CBCS and secondly NEP 2020. IQAC is more determined than ever to focus more on OBE.

6. Distance education/online education:

So far, our college Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya, does not have any Distance Education System. On the positive side, the college has recently applied to introduce several PG Courses in subjects like English, Bengali, History, Geography, Political Science and Library Science from Netaji Subhas Open University, Kolkata. They are soon to make a field visit. Application date: 05/04/2024. Online Education System is operative in the sense we take regular classes on online platforms such as WhatsApp, Google Classroom, Zoom, etc. While doing so, we take the help of PPTs, YouTube, INFLIBNET, etc. This has also given way to taking class at any convenient time, both for students and teachers. The college is ICT-facilitated with a number of teachers having good IT skills who guide the

remaining others to use the same. Library is fully automated, and e-resources can be used by students at any time

Institutional Initiatives for Electoral Literacy

1. Whether Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) has been set up in the College?

Yes. The Electoral Literacy Club of Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya has been set up in the year 2021 with Mr Bishnu Dev Das, Assistant Professor of Political Science, as its convenor and TIC Mr Basob Ghosh as its chairperson. Recently, the club has been reformed with five other esteemed members, including the Honourable President of the Governing Body, Nuralam Shaikh.

2. Whether students' co-ordinator and co-ordinating faculty members are appointed by the College and whether the ELCs are functional? Whether the ELCs are representative in character?

While the faculty coordinator and coordinating faculty members have been duly employed by a proper GB Resolution, the student coordinator and the student members have not yet been inducted specifically, as the whole NSS unit is working under the banner of the club. Yes, all members of the club are fully functional. Yes, the ELCs are fully representative in character.

3. What innovative programmes and initiatives undertaken by the ELCs? These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of ethical voting, enhancing participation of the under privileged sections of society especially transgender, commercial sex workers, disabled persons, senior citizens, etc.

Since its establishment, the Electoral Literacy Club of Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya has been playing a dynamic and active role in taking several good initiatives. Its convenor has put efforts into training the students to hold mock parliaments and youth parliaments. It has been active in arranging programmes such as voter awareness among students. Posters for voting awareness are pasted at different places by ELC. Week-long initiatives to encourage new voters to vote for democracy have been arranged. The students are also engaged in generating consciousness and awareness among the local people. For the elderly and disabled, the ELC has helped set up a new ramp in the college. The district administrator (DM) and the local administrator (BDO) very often call the ELC for the implementation of many of their projects through college, and the ELC willingly helps them. The Election Commission regularly makes our college the polling station for two booths, and for that, the ELC extends all its support. The Election Commission also makes our college house hundreds of

paramilitary/police forces every election, and our ELC extends all positive support for that. ELC also provides a support system for voters who become accidentally sick by providing them with special room and assistance. The ELC constantly urges the District Election administration to improve the infrastructural capacity of the college so that in the future, democratic avenues will become broader. 4. 1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya, being a Government-Aided college affiliated to University of Kalyani (KU) strictly adheres to and follows the Curriculum and Academic Calendar of the affiliated University. The Institution effectively implements the curriculum with reasonable flexibility and with strategies that are suitable to the students. At home, the Heads of the Departments and faculties, and at University, the member/s of the Board of Studies, are actively involved in planning and delivering the curriculum.

At the commencement of Academic Session, at the instruction of TIC/Principal, the IQAC arranges a meeting to prepare the Academic Calendar. The Calendar is prepared by adhering to KU Calendar and is uploaded to the college website and displayed on college notice board.

- 1. Academic calendar: In the Academic calendar, all the important timelines, events and dates like annual and semester-wise commencement of classes and examinations, available class days, evaluation schedules for both internal and external examinations, seminars, annual functions, farewell ceremonies, freshers' welcome, institutional holidays, parent-teacher meetings, study tours, excursions, and celebratory days are earmarked, and best efforts are made to stick to the Calendar.
- 2. Routine: A master-routine and afterwards department-wise routine is prepared by the Routine Committee and respective departments under the instruction of TIC/Principal and IQAC, keeping in mind the newly-introduced CBCS system and recommended class, hour per credit. Routines thus prepared are displayed on the college website, notice board and are personally conveyed to the students.
- 3. Departmental Meeting: Departmental meetings are held on a regular basis for the effective curriculum delivery mentioned in the Academic Calendar and master routine. Pertinent issues such as syllabus distribution and class distribution, session plan and lesson plan, planning of class tests, internal examinations and evaluations, methodologies of teaching, remedial/tutorial classes for weak students, departmental infrastructural requirements, books and study materials to be recommended and purchased, mentoring and monitoring the students, curricula activities, departmental seminars, invited and special lectures, different extracurricular activities like debate, quiz, recitation, songs, dances, essay writing competition, study tours, painting, poster making, and many other things are discussed and resolutions are taken. All resolutions are displayed on notice boards.

- 4. Continuous Internal Assessment: Internal examinations are transparent, time-bound and effective. Teachers' Council under TIC/Principal and IQAC takes the lead role in planning, executing, and evaluating internal examinations in advance of each semester. Continuous Internal Assessment is done through various modes such as class tests, project works, field works, responses from emails and google softwares, storing in Google Classroom, Google Drive, various extracurricular activities, sports, culture, wall magazines, add-on courses, behavior checking, mapping COs and POs, etc. Attention is given to weak students.
- 5.ICT enabling: The college is constantly trying to make everyone ICT skilled. LMS has been introduced. Classes are taken using overhead projectors, smart classroom, laptops and PPT presentations.
- 6. Learning Resources: The college has a very good library with innumerable useful texts and reference books for students. It has KOHA and INFLIBNET facilities that allow access to many e-resources and relevant papers and research works for students.

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya adheres to the syllabi of University of Kalyani, which invariably integrate various cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum. The college also adds on new dimensions regarding these issues in the Curriculum by holding regular programmes like seminars and talks, camps, awareness programmes, health camps, etc.

From Academic year 2018-19 to 2022–23, the college has faced two systems: the 1+1+1 system and the CBCS system (with six semesters). We find an abundance of cross-cutting issues in both of these two systems.

We have Professional Ethics related issues in the subjects, like Philosophy, Education, Political Science English, Bengali. We have Gender related issues in subjects like English, Bengali, Political Science, Education, History. We have Environment related issues in subjects like ENVS, Geography, Education, English, Bengali. We have Environment and Sustainability related issues in subjects like Geography and ENVS.

In subjects like Environmental Science which is included under AECC Course, we have enormous stress on sustaining our environment, keeping our mother earth pollution free and green, keeping our place plastic free and smoke free, on waste management system, proper drainage system, malaria and dengue drive mission, keeping our rivers clean and flowing, etc. In the subject of Geography, sustainability issues are constantly dealt with.

Regarding Gender issues, in Language and Literature subjects like Bengali Language and Literature and English Language and Literature, there is no dearth of such issues. Rassundari Devi's Amar Jiban is one of the very first documents in India that deals thoroughly with gender issues.

In subjects like History, Philosophy, Education, there are many such crosscutting issues in the syllabi. Largely, the topics are on women's inequality, issues of other genders, women empowerment, gender sensitization, role of working women etc. Issues related to Professional Ethics are found in subjects like Education, Political Science, Philosophy (Medical Ethics), History, Geography. Environmental issues are elaborated in AECC subject Environmental Science. Similar issues are to be found in Geography. Human values and human rights related issues are elaborately discussed in subjects like Political Science, Education, Literatures, Philosophy and Geography.

The college regularly arranges different programmes for Gender sensitization, Awareness Programme, Health camps, and the free distribution of sanitary napkins. Seminars and discussions are regularly held on relevant cross-cutting issues. Various days like Environmental Day, World Earth Day, Water Day, International Women's Day, and Mother's Day are celebrated through Departments and NSS units of the college. The birthdays of great sons and daughters are also celebrated.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya, in alignment with UGC and NAAC guidelines, adopts various student-centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies for enhancing learning experiences of its students. Teachers use ICT-enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process.

In the field of experiential learning, to enhance students' learning outcome, regular study tours are conducted by all Departments of the college. Departments go for to visit museums, places of literary and historical importance, natural and archeological sites. Project works and field works are chiefly undertaken by Department of Geography and Education in order to transform classroom learning into practicability and to learn to write research papers. Education Department engages its students' in writing dissertations and presenting them, thus enhancing their critical thinking ability and reasoning capacity.

Participatory learning is introduced in the teaching-learning process to make it more student-centric. Student seminars (all Departments and IQAC-library), mock parliament (Political Science), debates (English Dept), Quizzes (centrally and English Dept), postermaking (History and Bengali), Sit and Draw (centrally), extempore (centrally), wall magazines (Bengali, English), singing and dancing (centrally), different sports (centrally) are conducted for the creative and cerebral growth of the students. Various cleanliness drives in and outside college, awareness and campaigning programmes come under participatory learning. Apart from these, all departments use the traditional chalk and talk method to engage them in the group discussion in the classroom. All departments take remedial/tutorial classes for weak students. All celebratory days are observed centrally.

Problem solving methodologies are incorporated in teaching-learning methods to facilitate students for further engagement. All departments engage their students in some brainstorming sessions where students are bombarded with many new ideas and are made to think on their own. This method enhances their critical and analytical power.

Teachers use ICT- enabled tools, including online resources for effective teaching and learning process. All Departments use ICT-enabled classroom such as the smart classroom at room no 10 and ICT-enabled class room such as room no 19. The target is not merely the delivery of teaching but also to attain PSOs through COs and POs. All Departments use wi-fi of the college to take online classes, mostly via Google Meet. Such practice started during pandemic and even continue now, both from home and college. All Departments use the e-resources of the college library and encourage their students to use e-resources through ILMS, KOHA, INFLIBNET, etc. There is a separate E-ZONE for that. All Departments take class through PPT presentations. The college library has OPAC that facilitates students accessing the library electronically. Computers are used by students in the Computer Lab.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

Response:

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya follows two systems - the Annual Method of 1+1+1 system and the new CBCS system which was introduced in the academic year 2018-19.

Apart from taking final Internal Assessment centrally, class tests or assignment works or project work are conducted by several Departments occasionally along with giving model questions and model answers. In all cases, results come out in time and they are displayed on the Departmental Notice Boards. Evaluated answer scripts are handed over to students for their contemplation and then taken back. Regular parent-teacher meetings are held to inform them about the students' performance and their strengths and weaknesses, based on which teachers readjust their teaching methodology and try their best to extract the best from the students.

In the Old system, there were 100 marks per subject, all written. In the new CBCS system, Full Marks per subject are 75, out of which 80% (60 marks) is set aside for writing and the rest 20% (15 marks) are left out for Internal Assessment. Out of this, 33.33% (5 marks) is set aside for attendance, and the remaining 66.66% (10) marks are set aside for Internal Assessment.

Accounts of attendance are maintained, and after calculation, the attendance records are displayed on the Departmental Notice Board and personally communicated to students in classrooms. Appropriate advice and steps are taken by mentors (teachers) for further improvement.

For taking central Internal Assessment for all students, following the Academic Calendar, Teachers' Council, under the instruction of the Principal, issues a notice and conducts a meeting. In that meeting, all the modalities (date, time, duration, marks, types of question- short, semi-broad, broad, mcq, project/assignment/dissertation etc , mode of exam- offline/online, tentative date of results, tentative dates of remedial classes if needed, question setters/evaluators etc) are discussed and resolutions are taken. Under the supervision of Heads of Departments, examinations are taken strictly and in a time-bound manner, answer scripts are evaluated, results come out, they

are displayed on the Departmental Notice Board and they are also intimated personally to students.

If any student has any grievance regarding his/her marks, the pupil approaches the concerned Head of the Department. HoD takes a serious note of this and resolves the problem accordingly in consultation with the Principal and Examination Sub-Committee.

For Final examination or Semester examination conducted by University of Kalyani, any sort of grievance of the students regarding poor marks, unexpectedly low marks, failed marks, the student can directly approach the college Office with proper documents for applying for Scrutiny, Review, RTI, etc and the Office provides appropriate forms and advises. The University also responds quickly in a time-bound fashion and shows the scrutiny and review results. In case of RTI, the University shows a photocopy of the evaluated answer script. Thus, the grievance is addressed.

The integration of COs and POs to the assessment process is done variously like Departmental notice boards, periodic

meetings with students, teachers and parents.

Programme Outcome (PO): Programme Outcome is the result or the benefits that a student should avail of, like episteme, skills, and attitudes, after the completion of a programme.

For example: Students of English Honours after graduation would be able to have:

PO1: A specialized knowledge of the Discipline or Subject

PO2: A sound understanding of mankind, nature and psychology

PO3: A fluent communication skill

PO4: Ability to think critically

PO5: Interdisciplinary knowledge

When the college publishes program outcomes and course outcomes of various programs, they are directly benefited, as they can now avail themselves of the choice or option to choose what course or programme to study in CBCS system and NEP 2020 system which offer multiple entry and multiple exits. Students will have their own preferences and objectives in choosing. Programme and Course outcomes also guide teachers to adjust their methodologies of teaching and delivering the curriculum. Faculties also come to know their strengths and shortcomings in teaching and delivery, and they can correct themselves.

Response:

One essential aspect of the teaching learning process is to map the COs and POs and their attainment. For this purpose IQAC has taken steps to create a framework to evaluate the attainment of COs and POs. So two methods can be applied for achieving the attainment level of the students.

Two aspects have to be taken into account. First the evaluations of students based on CIE (Continuous Internal Evaluation) like class tests, unit tests, assignment, viva voce, dessertations, fieldworks, projects and many more. The second is the End Semester Examinations which carry the greater share of marks. When we go to analyse the attainment, we have to consider both in order to judge the final outcome of the learning of the students. Every Department takes special care to map CO, PO attainment.

The first method is called the Direct Method. In this method the Department through various local assessment procedures measures the learning outcome of the students. :

The second method is called the Indirect Method. It is based on the basis of a survey carried out by the course instructor. He applies his methodology on the student undertaking the course. In such cases the student perceives his course outcome and comes to know about his attainment of COs.

The two methods are combined to get the final result. The End Semester examination result which carries the greater share of marks and the CIE, which carries the minimum share of marks are to be tallied in order to find out the attainment of COs and POs. Thus at the end of the attainment the student gets to know the neat outcome of his studies and the teachers get an opportunity to readjust his/her methodology of teaching.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya has created an ecosystem for innovations, Indian Knowledge System (IKS) and has taken initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge and technology. The outcomes of the same are evident.

The knowledge system so mentioned is scientifically reflected in the CBCS curricula of Kalyani University, which our college follows. Such knowledge is contained in subjects like Philosophy, History, Political Science, Education, Geography, Bengali and English. The study of Bengali literature may well reflect the regional, cultural designs of indigenous nature, the study of English may reflect the national culture and nuances as reflected in translated Indian literature and original Indian writing in English. The college very often upholds Yoga as a style of life. Our ancient Vedic knowledge disseminated through the congregation actually contributes to the overall development of personality of our students, leading to specific skills and expertise. Our learners are integrated into ancient Indian history, polity, geography, arts, music etc. This gives them a distinct self-identity and self-respect. Add-on course has been introduced for value-based

education. We mostly choose indigenous Bengali language and English language to communicate with our students both online and offline, following bilingual mode, as suggested by various Education Commissions of India. International Mother Language Day (February 21)), Yoga Day, Republic Day, National Youth Day, Netaji Birthday, Teachers' Day, Independence Day are celebrated with the motto of integration of Indian Knowledge systems. The college has created an atmosphere for innovation and research through Research Development Cell which has laid emphasis on Yoga and Traditional herbal gardening.

The college has created an ambience for innovation and research. The college has established a Research and Development Cell on 31.01.2023 with the aim of creating knowledge and information and their proper dissemination and transfer. Under the direction of IQAC, RDC organises seminars and online programmes for the benefits of teachers and students alike. The RDC of the college encourages all students to write research papers, dissertations. It encourages students to perform fieldwork, project work, study tours for research and experiential purpose. Under the direct involvement of RDC, the college has signed as many as 7 MoUs and has encouraged faculties to take part in faculty exchange programmes and other collaborative research activities. The RDC encourages all the faculties to publish original, plagiarism-free research papers in reputed UGC and foreign journals. The college library has an INFLIBNET facility that gives access to thousands of ebooks and ejournals and e-research papers.

The RDC has has laid emphasis on Yoga and Traditional herbal gardening which are integrally related to old Indian Knowledge system.

Entrepreneurship is one thing that the college encourages very much. The college occasionally organises seminars on job-oriented matters. In this respect, the college has organised seminars with Bandhan Bank, IIARI, George Telegraph, RICE and some other minor organisations. RICE chairman Samit Roy himself came on one occasion to inform the students about their career prospects. Students are oriented to earn their livelihood independently. Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya itself received Kanyashree Award 2023 from Govt of West Bengal for its outstanding activities in Kanyashri enrollment of girl students. The female students admission rates are much higher than their male counterparts in the academic year from 2018–19

to 2022–23. Whereas the total number of female students admitted is 9198, the male student admission is 7423. The female enrolment is 55.33% and the male enrolment is 44.60%. For maximum K2 beneficiaries in the college, the college got 3rd prize in the district of Murshidabad.

Individually, Istara Mehebuba got 1st prize and award for best Opposition leader in a programme organised by DPI (Directorate of Public Instructions) of Govt. of West Bengal in 2022. In the same programme, Asem Mubassir Alam, a very talented physically challenged boy in wheelchair, got 3rd prize in extempore competition.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1

The institutional governance and leadership are in accordance with the vision and mission of the Institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as NEP implementation, sustained institutional growth, decentralization, participation in the institutional governance and in their short term and long term Institutional Perspective Plan.

Response:

Relentless efforts are being employed in order to materialize the visions and missions of the institution through various statutory and non-statutory bodies of the college. The Governing Body, which is the highest decision-making body, works in close collaboration with the Principal, IQAC, Teachers' Council, Library and NSS who implement various policies and programmes of the college in accordance with and under the guidance from State and National bodies like WBHED and UGC who from time to time lead us with their Statutes, Rules, Ordinances and Circulars.

The Governing Body takes all important decisions in Finance, Education and Infrastructural Development. The Governing Body entrusts and directs the Principal to implement, supervise and maintain all aspects mentioned above. The Principal engages the IQAC, Teachers' Council, NSS, all Heads of the Departments, all Convenors of various academic committees, sub-committees and Cells, all faculty members, Librarian and non-teaching staff along with casual staff of the college to execute the directions of the Governing Body.

The IQAC of the college plays a central role in implementing, sustaining and enhancing the plans and projects as forwarded by the Governing Body, Principal, stakeholders and from various bodies like UGC. The IQAC is rigorous and uncompromising in its attitude to uphold the values and dignity of the college and works in coordination with all bodies like Teachers' Council to achieve excellence. Regular feedback system is operational.

Teachers' Council relentlessly engages itself in all kinds of academic activities. Teachers' Council makes Master Routine, Academic Calendar, holds timely class tests, CIE (Continuous Internal Examinations) and University Examinations. Teachers' Council in collaboration with IQAC, introduces and approves new courses, if any, oversees admission process, takes definitive steps in implementing CBCS Courses and NEP 2020, in evaluating and reforming teaching-learning process and making and implementing various academic regulations. The college is a firm believer in participatory learning process and encourages every stakeholder to actively take part in participatory process.

In the administrative and academic domain of the college, decentralization is the key word and the management is participatory. Academic and administrative duties and responsibilities are distributed among the staff and the students. Directives emanate from the Governing Body and the Principal to IQAC and Teachers' Council or to Heads of Departments or to Convenors or to NSS or to Librarian or to Head Clerk who then disseminate the same to appropriate stakeholders for performance.

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With approval of Governing Body, the Principal and IQAC create different committees and subcommittees and cells for the smooth functioning of every organ of the college. The committees undertake new initiatives, sustain them and enhance them. Various important days like National and International Holidays, Annual Days, Memorial Days are observed. Community works in the neighborhood are done by NSS together with various Departments.

The heads of the departments enjoy considerable freedom and autonomy in running the departments. Following the Academic calendar, they make syllabus distribution, lesson plans, plan for departmental tours, and organize internal examinations, class test, debate, quiz, posters, wall magazines, etc on their own.

Response:

The plan and policy structures of Murshidabada Adarsha Mahavidyalaya are clearly in alignment with the mission and vision of the institution. The institution has a concrete perspective plan that is effectively deployed with regard to policies, administrative set up, appointments, service rules, and procedures.

As for policies, the institution has created several policies in accordance with National policies and State policies. For example, M.A.Mahavidyalaya has a zero tolerance policy regarding Ragging. It also has a zero tolerance policy for crime and sexual harassment against women. The institution has a policy to make the campus plastic free. Providing pure drinking water is another policy of the college. Providing freeships to needy students is another remarkable policy for the college. Making barrier free movement for disabled learners is on the priority list of the college. Making the college a green campus is another policy.

Our administrative set up clearly follows a hierarchical order, which is shown through an organogram. On the top, there is the highest decision-making body, the Governing Body. The Principal instructs, monitors and advises and manages different academic, administrative and developmental projects as imparted by the Governing Body. The IQAC plans such projects and

makes them materialized through different bodies like Teachers' Council, Different Committees, subcommittees and cells, NSS, Finance Committee, etc. Whereas academic subcommittees exclusively deal with all academic matters, Finance Committee deals exclusively with financial matter in the College. The role of Bursar in this respect is central. However, all committees are approved by the Body. All financial proposals are finalized only by the Governing Body.

Among the non-statutory bodies, many academic subcommittees can be mentioned. They regularly hold meetings with their members and plan various academic, non-academic, curricular and extra curricular activities under the guidance of the Principal, Teachers' Council and IQAC.

The appointment process, service rules, promotions, and other procedures of the UGC recognised teachers and Librarian are effected by Rules, Regulations and Statutes of UGC and West Bengal Higher Education Department. The appointment process, service rules, promotions, and other procedures of the State Aided College Teachers are effected by Rules, Regulations and Statutes West Bengal Higher Education Department.

The appointment process, service rules, promotions and other procedures of non-teaching staff are effected by Rules, Regulations and Statutes of West Bengal Higher Education Department and Management Body.

The main focus of such strategies and policies has been to continuously improve the following areas in a tangible way. The key areas are: Curricular Planning and Implementation, Academic Flexibility and capacity Building, Teaching Learning Process, Research Collaboration and Extension Activities, Academic Infrastructural Facilities, Student Support and Progression, Internal Quality Assurance System and Governance, Leadership and Management.

Performance Appraisal System:

Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya has a strong performance appraisal system for teaching and non-teaching staff. Teachers are regularly encouraged to attend various professional development programmes like Faculty Development Programme, Refreshers' Course, Short Term Course, Project Works, attend national and international seminars and conferences, workshops, and write research papers in UGC-carelist journals and international journals. Non-teaching staff are encouraged to attend Management Development Programmes.

The college has in operation a PBAS (Performance Based Appraisal System) at the instruction of West Bengal Higher Education Department and UGC in order to maintain quality. The teacher is asked to prepare sheets and data sheets or Teachers' Diary where they record all their activities and they submit them to IQAC. IQAC, after scrutinizing, submits the same to TIC/Principal who approves them. Then the concerned teacher is again asked to submit a filled-in proforma for CAS to IQAC for approval in GB. After approval, a letter is forwarded to Higher Education Department for Government Nominee and another is sent to Kalyani University for Subject Expert, who scrutinizes them further after screening him/her and after approval, they send the file to Higher Education Department. West Bengal Higher Education Department further scrutinizes the file and, if everything is okay, promotes the teacher to the next stage as per UGC pay-scale.

For non-teaching staff, all their activities are recorded in sheets and they get them approved from IQAC and Principal and afterwards from the Governing Body and then to Higher Education Department. Then they are promoted by following government rules.

If anybody's performance is poor, the principal talks to the concerned person to improve it.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Strategies of the Institution for Optimal Utilization of Resources:

- For financial assistance the college receives salary grants from the Government as per norms for teaching and non-teaching employees of the institution after annual assessment done by the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal.
- The institution receives bonus (non-salary grants) from government at a stipulated rate sanctioned by the government.
- Fees collected from students acts as a regular source of resource.

The Finance Committee of the institution proposes and discusses the annual budget after the funds are received from various sources. The IQAC and other Committees forwarded proposals for infrastructure development are taken into consideration. Proposals for purchase of library books, computers, furniture, laboratory equipment's, building renovation work and stationery are taken into consideration. After discussion the Finance Committee forwards the expenditure proposal for Governing Body approval. After approval from GB the proposal for purchase is forwarded to the Purchase Committee for necessary action. The accounts of the college are audited regularly through Internal Audit and External Audit.

The fund mobilizations take place in the following areas:

- Development of physical facility
- Introduction of innovative teaching learning process
- Conduct of seminars
- Sports and cultural activities
- Student support
- Software, internet and electricity charges
- Library books purchase

The internal checking of financial responsibility is entrusted with the Finance Committee and TIC of the institution. The internal checking ensures continuous documentation of financial transaction of day to day expenditure The regular income and expenditure of the college is supervised by the administrative staff. The bills for expenditure are finally placed before the TIC and Finance Committee by the Accountant for final scrutiny. Utilization certificate are processed after proper mobilization of funds and are recorded in the audit. The Purchase Committee of the institution monitors any purchase of college. E- Tenders and Quotations are invited for purchase and the final purchase is made after the comparison of quoted prices received.

External Audit:

The external audit is carried out by the Government appointed auditor who takes into account the fund received and disbursed by the college. The external audit had been conducted for the year 2018-19, 2019-20, 2020-21, 2021-22, 2022-23.

Response:

During the last five years, Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya has initiated Gender Audit and has taken measures for the promotion of gender equity. In our curricula, we have explicit and implicit references to gender equity, and in our classroom interactions, we make the most of the curricula to apprise our students of various genders about gender equality and gender neutrality.

Outside the curriculum, we take different measures to promote gender equity and gender neutrality. ICC (Internal Complaints Committee), WDC,Students' Grievance and Redressal Committee, Anti-Ragging Cell and IQAC have made relentless and incessant efforts, and they are still making collaborative efforts to keep the momentum going.

- In order for every girl student to feel safe and secure inside the campus, we have installed close circuit cameras (CCTVs) almost everywhere, which are constantly monitored by a team headed by the principal.
- Washrooms are cleanly maintained, and it is ensured that sufficient lights are available in ladies' washrooms and in every nook and corner of the college.
- Every student, including the girl student, is provided with an ID card. No outsider is allowed to enter the college without registering his/her name in the register book that is kept at the gate.
- There is a Girls' Common Room equipped with a Napkin Vending Machine and a Covered Dustbin and with an attached well-furnished washroom on the ground floor, just at the right side of the main gate. Girl students can avail of sanitary napkins as and when required by them.
- Girl students can always approach, in any kind of psychological crisis or mental disturbance to ICC, WDC, SGRC or in case of ragging to ARC. During the counseling period, absolute confidentiality is maintained as the girl students open up their emotions and feelings and secrets. These committees are very strict and take immediate redressal measures in favor of the girl students, if confronted with any untoward or unpleasant event.
- Adequate number of girl students take participation not only in curricular activities but

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also in extracurricular activities like sports and cultural programs, and they have a great history of success. Similarly, in NSS, girl students very often outcompete their male counterparts in regard to performance. The college has formed a habit to include a substantial number of female participants everywhere.

- Programmes, discussions and seminars on Gender-sensitization, Women Development, Mothers' Day Celebration etc are conducted on a regular basis.
- Regular parent teacher meetings are held to discuss with the guardians the needs and necessities, not only the daughters but also the sons, their problems, and a possible solution. It is an effective measure to reduce dropout rates.
- There are a good number of toilet facilities for female students and teachers.
- A good number of seminars are organised for gender sensitization, women's empowerment, etc.

Best Practice 1

Title of the Practice

Women Empowerment in a Migrant-hit, early-marraige affected locality

Objectives of the practice

- To stop early marriages among poor, migrant-labourers affected Muslim girls
- To make them intellectually and financially independent
- To spread light of education to them and through them to generations to come
- To make a happy society

The context

The locality surrounding Murshidabad Adarsha Mahavidyalaya is a minority-based locality. Most of the parents of the girl students are migrant labourers, working in different parts of the country, biri shramiks, daily labourers, and often jobless. Most of these girl students are first generation learners. Due to financial constraints, lack of education and lack of a scientific belief system, they become victims of early marriage. To educate such girl children and empower them is a mammoth task.

The practice

Despite the advancement of science, technology, globalization, computerization, bills for women, reservationreservations for women, laws for women, the women are still not free and empowered. This is very critical in a condition like our college. Our college and different committees and cells are very proactive toin protecting our girl students and to make them financially independent and strongwilled. Every committee has a Coordinator and some members. They together sit for and make a plan of action. The Governing Body, the Principal, IQAC Coordinator, NAAC Coordinator, Teachers' Council and every wing of the college take special care and attention for our girl students. A 24x7 surveillance system has been installed, and everything is closely monitored to prevent any untoward incidents against women.

We have arranged a fully furnished, modern Common Room for girls where resting place such as

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chairs,bed, benches are available. Stretcher and wheel chair for physically challenged are available. A modern washroom is also attached. We have kept a first aid preparation ready for them. Moreover, we have kept a vending machine for sanitary napkins ready for them. We do regular mental counseling for our girl students. We do treat them as our own daughters.

Regular seminars, talks, invited lectures, and gender sensitization programs are held to give them strength and power. We work seamlessly so that our girl students can get the proper skills for employability. We tirelessly work for them to sail them through stages of higher education, NET/SET. We devote time and energy to making them successful entrepreneurs, leaders, social workers, and good human beings.

Evidence of success:

Many of our girl students every year get admitted to various higher education institutes to complete their MA, Msc (Geography), PhD, NET/SET, B.Ed, and they do get success. Many enroll for various competitive examinations like WBCS, SSC, STAFF SELECTION, TET, and other examinations. They do achieve success. Many of our girl students do business as well. For example, the following students passed NET/SET/TET: Mamtaj Shireen (SET-2023), Sabia Sabnam (TET-2022), Ronjila Khatun (TET-2022) and Sabina Yeasmin (TET-2022)

In 2022, Istara Mehebuba got 1st Position of opposition leader in Intra College Youth Parliament Competition. In 2023, Susmita Kisku, a tribal woman, got 3rd position in district level sports.

Problems encountered and Resources needed:

- Our achievements are not without obstacles. In fact, our ways are stony and thorny. We have a severe teacher shortage. Within our limited capacity, we do our hardest.
- Girl student dropout is a major issue.
- Early marriage is another big issue.
- Reluctance of parents to send their daughters to college is the next problem.
- Lack of sufficient government or non govt funding is another problem.
- Ignorance and superstition among girl students is another problem.
- Psychosomatic changes among college going girls are a problem and to cope them is a challenge.
- More knowledgeable resource personnel are required.
- More awareness and consciousness among guardians and students are required.

Best Practice 2

Title of the Practice

Blood Donation Camp: A noble effort to mitigate blood crisis

Objectives of the practice

- To donate blood to save human lives
- To encourage all to donate blood for their own good health
- To help nearby hospitals and nursing homes with sufficient supply of blood
- To instill awareness of the benefit of blood donation among the mass

The context

Blood is vital to medical industry. Every year in every hospital and nursing home and health centre thousands of bottles of blood is required to meet the demands. In our own locality also, like in Domkal Super Speciality Hospital, Murshidabad Medical College and Hospital and nearby nursing homes and health centres, blood on emergency basis is needed. In order to cope with such life-saving situations, the college regularly organises blood donation camps mostly through the NSS unit of the college

The practice

The practice of donating blood in our college is long drawn, to such extent that it has become an identification mark of our college. All teachers, non-teaching staff and students joysously participate in such camps so as to give a festive look to it. Previously teachers themselve organised such camp. From 2018-19, since the creation of NSS, NSS has taken it over. Teachers, students alike donate blood.

Evidence of Success

One such blood donation camp took place on 29.03.2022 at room no 5. 46 students from various departments and many teachers donated blood. Dr S.M.Sarfaraj from Domkal Super Speciality Hospital, Abdur Sofir (MT Lab) and Md Mortuj (Murshidabad Medical College and Hospital) attended. 47 pouches of blood have been collected and donated. Every donor was provided with a certificate.

In the second instance, a blood donation camp was organised on 16.3.23 at room no 27 31 students donated blood. Dr Nazfat Benazir from and other medical staff attended the camp. 31 pouches blood was collected and donated. Every donor was provided with a certificate.

NSS Unit received two awards and certificates from Govt of West Bengal for Blood Donation Camps, one in 2022 and another in 2023.

Our college is situated in such a remote area far away from city that we feel we are blessed to have such an opportunity to serve them.

Our objective is to transform this first generation learners into a tangible human resource force for the development of the locality as well as contributing to the human resource development of the country. By educating them we are actually educating the future mothers of the country. As Swami Vivekananda has said "If you want to build a nation, first educate your women." With this motto in mind, we dedicate ourselves in teaching them and let them know their true potential.

The locality of Islampur is circled by a huge number of remote backward downtrodden migrant labour based villages. Many of the parents of our students never had a formal schooling. The problem of migrant labour is acute here, as the fathers of our female students work in Delhi, Haryana, Kerala, Mumbai as migrant workers. During Pandemic, this aspect became very horrible. Secondly, due to lack of formal schooling, ignorance and superstition grip them very often. The needs of the adolescent, the menstrual hygiene, the general wellbeing of the future mothers and professionals are mostly ignored. Early marriage is a monster in such a locally, which also increases the rate of dropouts among girls in college. Even after taking admission they are misguided, leave the college midway and get married. In some few cases it has been noted that they continue their education after marriage and childbirth.

The college takes serious note of such incidents and take all possible measures to stop such ignorance - driven nuisance. We in the college take the following measures but not restricted to::

- 1. Take Regular feedback and a surveillance as to what untoward things (dropout, early marriages, acute financial crisis in the family) are happening to our girl students. This needs a special kind of exercise as most of our girl students feel shy to tell their stories openly.
- 2. The female teachers take special time out to interact with our girl students about their background, bodily and psychic wellbeing, their menstrual hygiene etc and after one or two semesters, their shyness goes away.
- 3. Different types of seminars, talks programs are held on gender sensitisation, women empowerment, entrepreneurial skills, woman health, health check up camps, mental counseling,
- 4. State government scholarships like Kanyashree are offered to all girl students admitted in the college. The girl students can also availe Swami Vivekananda merit based scholarship. The college has its own freeship policy based on which half of the fees are subsidised. All these schemes act as essential fuel for girl students to continue their studies. Teachers always continue to update these things to them.
- 5. Teachers are very serious about taking classes as they know their girl students come from backward conditions, so they have some extra responsibility and duty towards them.
- 6. Teachers also take time out to convince the parents of girl children anot to marry them off early so that in future they can be financially independent and look after their own families.

- 7. It is our privilege that sometimes the local administration like BDO comes to our college and wants to know the nitty gritty of socially and financially backward girl students, specially Mislims and SCs and STs.
- 8. It is also our privilege that sometimes our local MLA and MP come to our college to learn about the status of girls students.

It is our pride that our minority community and SC/ST/OBC girl students get high success in academic and other fields. Our claim is not without proof. In the academic year 2018-19 to 2022-23, Out of 23 students who got attractive placement in service sectors , 8 of them are girls and 8 out of 8 are Muslim girls.

Another instance is in the field of student progression to higher education from our college there were 50 students placed in the academic year 2018-19 to 2022-23. Among them 25 are girl students. Among the 25 girl students 22 are from Muslim community. This strongly shows that we have really become a instrument for upliftment for Muslim girls in particular in this minority-based locality.

If we look at student admission, we will see that more and more girl students are taking admission into our college even greater in number than their male counterparts. In the last five years the total number female students admitted is 9198 as against the male number of 7423. The percentage of female enrollment is 55.53 whereas the male percentage is 44.60. Most of the girls being Muslim, this is indeed a remarkable indication of the achievement of the college.

Again, between 2018-19 to 2022-23, among the 19 students who passed UGC NET/SET/TET examinations, 8 were girls and 4 were Muslim girls. Their names are Mamtaj Shireen (SET-2023), Sabia Sabnam (TET-2022), Ronjila Khatun (TET- 2022) and Sabina Yeasmin (TET-2022). All these things prove our claim that our college is really dedicated to the upliftment of our girl students in general and Muslim girl students in particular.

The college is registered under 2f & 12B of UGC act and is affiliated to University of Kalyani. As per guidelines of NAAC given in its manual we have prepared our SSR. When this SSR was prepared, individual efforts as well as collective efforts were remarkable. The journey has been uphill but the pleasure is no less denied. Our college is located at a remote place, 32 kms away from the nearest railway station, Berhampore Court, and is a minority-based, migrant-labour populated area, where most are either bidid shramik or daily labourers, where the light of education has not reached all. These are socially and economically marginalised people who strive hard to earn their daily livelihood. Despite these things, our college has put forward an allround effort to the path of sustainable development of the colleg. We hope that we can transform these first generation learners into the assets of the nation. We are humble enough to know our shortcomings but we dream big. May today's one small step forward lead us to highway of accreditation.
